# 2019 Men of Valor Conference



On January 26th, about 80 men carved out about 6 hours to eat, sing, listen to challenges from 9 different speakers, and then eat again. The theme of the conference was "Building Up and Tearing Down Strongholds". The men were challenged to demolish strongholds that the enemy has been permitted to build because we have given him room to build them. They were also challenged multiple times to build up the right kind of strongholds in their own lives. Of the 9 speakers, Pastor Jon and Pastor Andrew each spoke from First Baptist. Others who

spoke were Pastor Bill Hossler of Evergreen Missionary Church, Rob Ebmeyer of Impact, Pastor Jon Bell of Impact, Pastor Nathan Gray of Elmdale Church of the Nazarene, Pastor Mark Hardy of Lowell Church of the Nazarene, Pastor Kevin Reed, and Dan Boon of Impact. Pastor Andrew spoke out of Ezekiel and talked about how God profaned the temple because Israel had made an idol out of it. It was a stronghold that kept them from the true worship of God. It was a reminder that we may have strongholds that we think are good and are unaware that they are keeping us from pursuing the glory of Christ. Pastor Jon spoke out of Psalm 1 to show how God uses His Word to build up a stronghold in the believer's life. He gave them some practical ways to develop the discipline of reading and engaging in God's Word, so that they are like a tree planted by streams of water. There were about 16 men from FBC at the conference.

This ministry was started by Dr. Bill Mounce, and he has partnered with many of the top seminary professors of some of the top seminaries in the country to provide a trusted resource. Here is one of the best parts about it... it is free for you to use! All you would need to do is to go to <a href="www.biblicaltraining.org">www.biblicaltraining.org</a> and sign up. Like I said, it is free and there is no trial period. The only cost is if you were to desire to be a part of one of the certificate programs or if you wanted to purchase supplemental material such as a commentary or theology book as a recommended resource. I would encourage you to check this out. By the way, they have a sweet app that has all their courses for you to either stream or download and listen to on the go.

Soon, we will be launching some different learning tracks on our website, using Biblical Training, to help you be more intentional about growing in your knowledge of the Word and being better equipped to carry out ministry. We are calling them E-Lectives. Our desire is to give you a road map toward learning more about theology, church history, missions, and God's Word in general. We also want to equip you with skills in the area of leadership and personal spiritual formation. Lord willing, we will be launching this by the end of February.

"Therefore, be imitators of God, as dearly loved children"
— Ephesians 5:1

Covenant is one of the most important themes in the Old Testament. As we read through Hebrews 8-10 during the month of February, we will see that this major theme culminates in the work of Jesus. Jesus is the mediator of the new covenant. Every month, we celebrate Jesus's blood, which is the blood of the new covenant (1 Cor. 11:25). Christians are under the new covenant.

Jeremiah 31:31-33 is the primary passage that looks forward to a new covenant. In that passage, we find these important words: "I will be their God, and they shall be my people." The result of God's new covenant is a people that belongs to God, a people to whom God has bound himself. However, this is not a new promise. In fact, Moses says to Israel, "You have declared today that the Lord is your God...And the Lord has declared today



that you are a people for his treasured possession" (Deut. 26:17-18). However, the Mosaic covenant did not succeed in making a people for God. Why? Because Israel "did not continue in my covenant" (Heb. 8:9). But under the new covenant, God creates a people who truly know him. They are his people.

What does this have to do with FBC's Discipleship Pathway? How is this relevant to how we connect with one another?

God did not establish a covenant with you and another with me. Rather, he established a covenant, not with many persons, but with a people. Therefore, to claim covenantal status is to commit to covenantal obligations, not only to God but to one another. We are God's people. Therefore, you and I are bound together just as much as God has bound himself to us. This agrees with Jesus's prayer in John 17, where he prays "that they may all be one...that they also may be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me."

The depth to which we connect with one another is a testament to the covenant that binds us to God. With whom can you establish, deepen, or reconcile a relationship to display your participation in God's covenant?

# CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

## Family Time - Faith Path Legacy Workshop

I had several people tell me that they wished that they could have attended Sunday's Faith Path Legacy workshop, but could not for whatever reason. If you missed the last workshop, and had hope to attend - this is for you!

The base for all of our Faith Path Legacy Workshops are the verse Deuteronomy 6:6-7 "These commandments that I give you today are to be upon your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up."

When Moses shared these words with the people of Israel, he specifically pointed out the necessity of active and regular parental involvement in the spiritual lives of their children. God has revealed great truths to us, yet often we do not engage as a family in seeking to learn about and understand these truths. Various studies indicate that more than 90 percent of American homes have at least one Bible in them, but there is a difference between owning one and reading one. There's also a difference between owning a Bible and being actively involved in family Bible study.

#### Make the Time

We are so used to the hectic pace of our daily lives that it becomes difficult to fit "one more thing" into our schedules. Unfortunately, when it comes to family Bible study, it should not be viewed as one more thing but as a central focus of our devotion to God. It is a parental responsibility commanded by God, and it also provides a wonderful opportunity to help build and strengthen bonds between family members.

One key step, then, in laying the groundwork for edifying family Bible study is making a commitment

to set aside specific and regular time to gather together as a family.

### Spiritually Nurturing Children

Next, the verse tells us to "impress" God's commandments upon our children. Making such an impression on children generally requires a recurrence, meaning repetition. For children to absorb God's truths, regular times of family Bible study, devotion and worship are important. Memorizing portions of Scripture also becomes important in making a godly impression on children. The verse also instructs parents to "talk about them," meaning that we are to engage in conversation with our children that includes God and His commandments. The passage implies that we are to do this everywhere - at home, when traveling, when resting, when facing each new day, etc. Too often, we set aside one day or a portion of a day for church worship, then neglect the reality of God in our daily lives the rest of the week. But if we truly believe in God and His truths to the point of committing our lives to His service, then we need to make God a part of everything we do. Again, this is easier said than done. Nevertheless, the point here is to include God in our daily lives, as an example to our children.

#### Being a Role Model

Finally, don't become legalistic about your family Bible study times or beat yourself up about missing a scheduled time. As a parent, strive to be a role model to your children about the importance and reality of faith in your life, but do so without being a negative example. Making God a genuine reality in your daily life is more important than sticking to a strict schedule. Prior to Moses offering insights regarding parental involvement in the spiritual lives of children, he writes, "Love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength" (Deuteronomy 6:5 NIV). Jesus, too, repeated this phrase in the Gospels (see, for instance, Matthew 22:37).

We must first commit our lives to God before we can effectively pass on our legacy of faith to our children. This commitment must begin with our love for God with every aspect of our being.



#### Tips for Family Bible Time

While there are no definitive techniques or methods to family Bible study that will apply to every family, here are some general principles.

Be Consistent - Set aside a specific day and time for your family Bible study and stick to is as best as you can.

Don't Give Up - Keep at it even if you miss a few times, pick up where you left off and start again.

Keep it Short - The younger your child - the shorter the attention span.

Keep it Simple - You may wish to find a good children's Bible and read some stories from that, as including passages from the Bible.

Involve the Kids - Make sure that the kids are involved in the time.

Have Fun - The kids will look forward to it, if it is enjoyable for them.
