Christmas Trees

Introduction: Martin Luther was the first to use Christmas trees to decorate his church. He was inspired by reading Isaiah 60. The trees were to communicate to the people in his day that Christ has come as the <u>Light</u> of the world to bring everlasting life to all who would believe.

Trees are related to the Christmas story. Note three trees in the Bible that illustrate three truths related to the gospel and Christmas:

I. The tree in the garden revealed man's <u>pride</u> and brought <u>separation</u> from God Genesis 3 In the midst of the garden of Eden God placed a tree with the only prohibition given to Adam (2:15-17). This tree was a <u>test</u> of Adam's love and obedience.

In Genesis 3 evil is introduced = not by God but by <u>Satan</u>. He caused Adam & Eve to doubt God's <u>Word</u> and question God's <u>love</u>. Adam & Eve ate from the tree and immediately lost their <u>innocence</u>. They also forfeited their <u>fellowship</u> with God and felt fear (3:8-9).

Before God expelled them from the garden He provided a <u>covering</u> for them with animal skins. God's penalty of death was <u>diverted</u> from Adam & Eve to an animal that died in their place. God then gave them a <u>promise</u> (3:15) related to the virgin birth of Christ and His suffering and death on the cross.

Because God is JUST – He demands <u>punishment</u> for sin. Because God is LOVING & MERCIFUL – He provided for man's sin through the <u>death</u> of His Son.

II. The tree of Golgotha revealed God's <u>pardon</u> and brought <u>reconciliation</u> Galatians 3:8; 1 Cor 15:3-4; Ps 22:16-18

The gospel is defined in 1 Corinthians 15:3-4 as the death of Christ and His resurrection. It was a fulfillment of the Old Testament Scriptures.

- Micah foretold that Christ would be born in <u>Bethlehem</u> (Micah 5:2).
- Isaiah prophesied of Jesus' virgin birth (Isaiah 7) and His crucifixion (Isaiah 53).
- > David was given a prophecy that described the crucifixion in detail in Psalm 22.

God came back to this sin-cursed earth as a man to physically walk with men and reveal His glory. But His primary purpose was fulfill God's promise in Genesis 3:15 (Mark 10:45). Jesus came to die and He died on a <u>tree</u> (Galatians 3:13; Deut 21:23).

When Jesus hung on the cross He bore our sins and He bore our <u>curse</u>. He was born to die so that me might be free from sin's <u>curse</u>.

Crucifixion was repulsive to many but to the Christian it represents something glorious, because it is through the cross we are saved from sin's curse and are <u>reconciled</u> to God (Gal 6:14; Rom 5:8, 11).

- The base of the cross touched the earth to remind us that God has come to earth to touch man.
- The top of the cross points heavenward to remind us that it is through the cross that we have access to <u>heaven</u>.
- > The arms of the cross stretch outward and cry out, "Whosoever will may come and have life."

III. The tree of heaven reveals God's <u>glory</u> and will bring <u>celebration</u> Rev 22:1-2 In the midst of the New Jerusalem is a tree planted next to a river. God did not want man to live forever on a sin-cursed <u>earth</u> with a sin-cursed <u>body</u>. Revelation 21-22 is a picture of paradise restored (1 Cor 15:21-22). **Conclusion:** These three trees give us the gospel:

- ➤ We have all become <u>cursed</u> because of the first tree (Rom 3:23; 5:12).
- ➤ We must run to the second tree where we find <u>forgiveness</u> and eternal life (Rom 5:18).
- If you have run to the second tree there will come a day when you will eat of the fruit of the third tree and enjoy the splendor of heaven and the celebration of the <u>redeemed</u> (Rev 22:13-14).

And He still invites anyone who seeks rescue from sin's curse to come!

Revelation 22:17 (ESV) — **17** The Spirit and the Bride say, "Come." And let the one who hears say, "Come." And let the one who is thirsty come; let the one who desires take the water of life without price.

Study Questions:

- 1. What other Christmas traditions reflect the gospel (example, candy canes)?
- 2. Share how you use Christmas traditions to teach your children the gospel found in the story of Christmas.
- 3. Compare Genesis 3:1-7 with 1 John 2:15-16. How does Satan use the same tactics from the Garden of Eden to tempt us today?
- 4. Why do people so easily embrace the Christmas story yet reject the message of the cross? What is the danger of sharing the birth and life of Christ without including His death and resurrection?
- 5. Read 2 Corinthians 3:18; 4:3-6. How does Satan blind men from seeing the glory of God in the face of Jesus during the Christmas season when the story of His birth is so prevalent? And how can we make sure that we help people see the glory of God in the face of Jesus during the Christmas season?
