
In a Messed-Up Situation, Tough Love Has to Keep Pointing Towards the Truth!

Notes:

Point 1: The many ways that faulty religious teaching does harm vv. 10-11

Point 2: Calling out the self-professed mess in Crete—but not giving up vv. 12-13

Point 3: Double-headed monster of bad ideas and bad authorities v. 14

Point 4: Know the difference between pure and defiled—both thoughts and feelings v. 15

Point 5: Cautionary tale—misrepresenting the true faith is a disastrous path v. 16

Discussion Questions:

- 1. Why do people 'rebel' against the true teaching of the Gospel (and this is inside the church, not outside)? What did the 'circumcision group' have to gain by their arguments?
- 2. How are 'whole households' damaged by legalistic teachings? What does such teaching do within a household (and by extension, a whole church)?
- 3. Why does Paul call out (by way of the poet Epimenides) the deep flaws attributed to Cretan culture? How will this help Titus in establishing functional churches?
- 4. What distinction is Paul making between 'pure' and 'corrupt'? How do we seek to be characterized as 'pure' in the midst of such a chaotic culture (then and now)?
- 5. Why should we hear the phrase "They claim to know God, but by their actions deny him" as a sobering, cautionary phrase for us? Take a look at Matthew 25:31-46, perhaps the scariest passage in the NT—what are we to learn from Jesus teaching there?
