December 2021

Why a Reading Plan: God speaks to people through His Word. It is what He uses to transform our lives by revealing truth to us and aligning our heart toward what He loves. The aim of this reading plan is not to merely check a box off a list, but to encourage our church body to spend time hearing from God. Reading the Bible is critical to a Christian's growth. But it is especially powerful to read the Bible with others. This reading plan is the basis for all of our D-Groups, and we hope it fosters deeper spiritual conversations in our families and between our members.

How to use this booklet: Each day has a passage of Scripture for you to read. There are one to two questions to prompt your study of the passage. We encourage the H.E.A.R. method for reading Scripture, especially if it is a new discipline for you. First, *highlight* a verse or verses that speak to your from the passage. Then, *explain* what those verses mean in relation to the broader context and how they support the main idea the author is trying to communicate. Next, *apply* this verse to your everyday life. What does this passage teach us about God? How does this passage point you to your need for Jesus? How do your thoughts, emotions, or actions need to change in light of this passage? Application should always be done in a spirit of prayer, as you are asking God to reveal to you how it applies. Finally, *respond*. This may be a specific action God is leading you to do. Very often it will be a prayer, either of thanksgiving, of confession of sin, or of petition asking for God's help.

**Memory Verse:** Because Scripture is God's Word, it is important that a Christian spend regular time memorizing God's Word so that he or she can always find encouragement and guidance from God. This month's memory passage is provided on the next page in the ESV, NIV, and NLT.

Proverbs 10:1-22:16 contain what we typically think of when we think of proverbs. Individual proverbs provide specific, everyday examples of wisdom. Because they are not necessarily organized in any clear way, it is best to read the chapter then choose one or two to explain, meditate on, apply, and respond to for the day.

Why is it right and good to declare God's praises among the nations (v. 3, 7, 10)? How do we do this?

### **Explanation:**

The psalms from this week have all focused on God being king (95:3; 96:10; 97:1; 98:6; 99:1). In what ways is a God a good and mighty king? How does your life reflect that God alone is king?

Highlight: Proverbs 26; Psalm 146

### **Explanation:**

25:1-29:27 are more proverbs of Solomon. For the most part, these are one verse sayings with no particular arrangement. It best to read the chapter and then pick one or two to journal about.

Psalms 146-150 are psalms of praise ("Hallelujah" is a Hebrew word that means "Praise Yahweh"), and as such, form an appropriate conclusion for the entire psalter. What has God done that makes him worthy of our praise and adoration?

Psalm 103 is a great biblical example of Christian meditation, which involves reminding ourselves of who God is and urging our soul to bless and praise him. Which of God's attributes or actions do you need to remind yourself of most today?

This psalm may be familiar because it is cited several times in the New Testament. However, what would it have meant to its original Israelite audience before Jesus? How does that better explain how the New Testament writes might use it (especially v. 1 & 7) to describe Jesus?
