How to Finish Well 2 Timothy 4:5-8

Paul wrote from prison with a sense that <u>death</u> was near. His two letters to Timothy were designed to equip and challenge him to follow Paul's footsteps into <u>faithful</u> ministry (2 Tim 4:5).

Consider that in this stage of Paul's life, he didn't appear to have a <u>successful</u> ministry in the eyes of the world (4:9-16). But what Paul DID have was the <u>presence</u> of Christ and His abiding <u>strength</u> and peace and the hope of eternal life (4:17-18). Note how Paul finished well:

I. No <u>Fear</u> 4:6; Phil 2:17; Mat 25:41

1. His life was in God's hands

We live in a word where people are FULL OF THEMSELVES. But in Philippians 2 we read that Christ <u>EMPTIED</u> HIMSELF of His rights of deity in order to <u>fulfill</u> the will of the Father, even if it meant going to the cross.

2. His death would be a blessing

The Greek word ANALUPSIS ("departure") had a variety of meanings:

- ➤ It implied freedom
- ➤ It implied going home (2 Cor 5:1-2)
- ➤ It implied a change of <u>destination</u> (Phil 1:21-23)

II. No Regrets 4:7

1. He fought the good fight

The Greek word AGOWN ("agony") implies that to experience <u>victory</u> in the battle it requires effort, hard work, discipline and struggle (2 Cor 11:23-27; 2 Cor 4:17; Rom 8:37). The fight for the Christian is on three fronts:

- 1) Hostility from the world Acts 9:16; Col 1:24
- 2) Struggles with his own flesh Rom 7:21-23; Gal 5:16
- 3) Battle against Satan and his principalities and powers Eph 6:10-13

2. He finished the race Acts 20:24

God had set for Paul a <u>specific</u> course (an apostle to the Gentiles). Note three essentials to run well and reach the finish line:

- 1) Self-Discipline 1 Cor 9:24-27
- 2) Self-Denial Heb 12:1
- 3) Savior-Focused Heb 12:2

3. He kept the faith ("the faith" = the truth of the Scriptures)

Note two ways in which Paul kept the faith:

1) He never lost confidence in the power of the Scriptures 1 Cor 15:3-4; Rom 1:16

2) He guarded the truth as a good steward of the <u>treasure</u> given to him 2 Cor 4:1-2; Phil 1:13-14

III. No Hesitation 4:8

"Henceforth" = LOIPON – "what remains". Paul knew that death wasn't the <u>end</u>. He looked forward to leaving this earth and seeing <u>Christ</u>.

Paul's confidence was based on his faith in the righteousness of Christ:

- 1. At salvation we receive the righteousness of Christ 2 Cor 5:21
- 2. After salvation we strive to live out that righteousness Rom 6:13
- 3. At death we are crowned with righteousness 1 John 3:2

Note that one of the marks of a true Christians is one who loves the <u>appearing</u> of Christ. And he <u>longs</u> for that to happen (Phil 3:20).

Study Questions:

- 1. If you facing death, what would be the last words you would want to leave with your loved one?
- 2. Why do unsaved people fear death? Why do some Christians fear death?
- 3. Note the phrase in 2 Timothy 4:17, "but the Lord stood with me." Share a time in your life when you felt alone and fearful but were strengthened by the Lord's presence.
- 4. Consider Paul's words, "I have fought the good fight." How does our 21st Century Christian culture expectations contradict with Paul's perspective of the Christian life?
- 5. From the following verses, how are we to experience victory over the world, the flesh and Satan?
- > "the world" 1 John 2:15-17
- ➤ "the flesh" Colossians 3:1-17
- ➤ "Satan" 2 Cor 2:11; 1 Pet 5:8
- 6. What hinders Christians today from persevering in their faith?
- 7. What prevents Christians today from "loving Christ's appearing?"
